## COMPACT SPEAKER: BEVERLY SPOONER



Beverly "Bev" Spooner is our speaker for the May 2017 Spring Luncheon. She will be speaking about the Silver Books as she currently sits on the GSMD National Committee for the Silver Books. She is a 50 year member who is our most current past State Governor. In 1965 she joined the Rhode Island State Society then trans-

ferred to the Colorado Society in February 2006. In Fall 2007 she became State Treasurer Pro-Tem, was elected State Treasurer officially in 2008 to 2011, and was State Governor from 2011 to 2014. At the conclusion of her term as State Governor, Governor General Lea Filson asked Bev to be on the National Committee for the Silver Books. She feels strongly the Mayflower Silver Books are the Gold Standard for all lineage societies.

In 2013, she co-wrote an article with Austin Spencer (Paid Genealogist for the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution) for the New England Historical Society about the Daniels Family, establishing the correct line connected the Daniels to the Sheffield Family. Together Bev and Austin wrote a complete line for the Sheffield Family not previously covered.

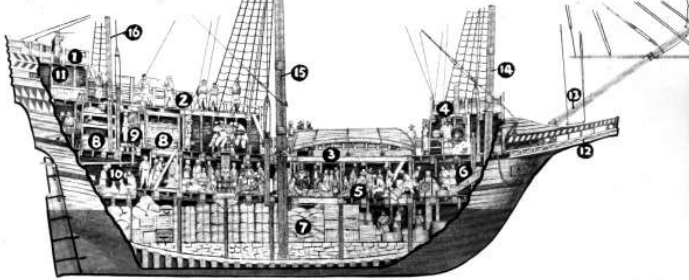

This year's Summer Picnic, the Society's fifth, will be held at the same location within the Air Force Academy FamCamp as previously on Sat., July 29, 2017. We'll have access to the pavilion from 9 AM to 3:30 PM that day. The reservation fee for the site was paid by the Colorado Mayflower Society, so it is FREE for the members and their guests to attend. The pavilion has a large grill, electrical outlets and many picnic tables. Bathrooms are nearby as is a children's play area. The picnic itself will start at 11 AM with our event going until 3:30 PM. ### Directions:

The location of the FamCamp area is on the northern part of the Air Force Academy. The picnic location is accessed via the Academy's North Gate entrance off 1-25, then turn left (south) onto Stadium Blvd (you'll see a big aircraft (B- 52) at the turn) and go 1.3 miles to turn left into the FamCamp area via Academy Drive. There is a sign on the right side of Stadium Blvd. pointing left which says "FamCamp/Picnic Area." Take first left onto Peregrine Drive (another FamCamp sign on right) and then a quick right onto a dirt road (before the FamCamp office). You'll see a sign (on pole under a diamond-shaped "Children Playing" symbol) which says Picnic Area # 2, 3. Follow dirt road until you see Picnic Pavilion # 3 (marked with building number 9017). Those without a Depart of Defense (DoD) ID card (active duty, retired military or dependent) CAN NOT get through the Academy's South Gate entrance off of 1-25, so plan to use the North Gate entrance. The FamCamp area is in a part of the base specifically open to the public. Further information may be required of non-

## A PIECE OF EARLY HISTORY OF THE COLORADO SOCIETY

We all remember that the Pilgrims did make landfall in the New World during November, 1620, but many people are a little fuzzy about just where that happened. Each Thanksgiving we all remember their settlement in Plymouth, but we tend to forget that the Mayflower's original New World harbor was at the tip of Cape Cod where the town of Provincetown is located today. That is where the Compact was signed, and it's the location where the passengers first walked on shore, found fresh water, and encountered Native Americans.

At the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century the citizens of Provincetown felt that Americans had lost touch with that part of the Pilgrim story and decided to do something about it. Money was raised to build a monument to the Pilgrims to remind everyone of where they first came ashore. A design matching a famous tower in Siena, Italy was chosen, despite some controversy about whether that was the best form of commemoration. President Theodore Roosevelt laid the cornerstone in 1907, and over the next three years the 252-foot granite tower was built. A call went out around the country, inviting towns, states, and Mayflower Societies to contribute stones to the monument in-

ter. Many nearby towns gave money to be recognized inside the grand tower, and several member Mayflower Societies also contributed. Somehow, the newly-formed Colorado Society presented a block of Colorado marble to the monument, and it's still there today.

The placement of the stones is a little haphazard, and it seems that they were simply inserted as they arrived or were inscribed at the construction site. Perhaps the Colorado stone ar-

rived late, or maybe our forebears wanted to remind everyone of our state's high altitude. In any case, our stone is near the top of the monument, by far the highest commemorative stone in the tower. As part of the preparation for the 2020 GSMD Congress, I recently made a trip to Provincetown for a two-day meeting. During a break from the meeting, I climbed the monument's internal ramps to see this reminder of our Society's early pride and accomplishment. As you will see from this photo, it's still there and in excellent condition. If you get a chance to visit the Cape and Provincetown, it's well worth your time to visit this monument. Show the local folks how well Colorado folks can climb those ramps, and make sure to see this relic of Colorado Mayflower Society history. And enjoy the great view!

**Joseph Carl Weber, 74**, of Golden, died December 17, 2016, in Denver, Colorado. The fifth of six children, he was born October 23, 1942 in Pueblo, Colorado to Joseph C. Weber and Evelyn W. (Burbridge) Weber. In June 2000, he married Carol J. (Billings) Sharkey in Denver. Since then they have lived in Golden. He was preceded in death by his parents and a sister, JoEllen (Weber) Rauch, in 2005. He is survived by his wife Carol and her children Kevin (Kimberly) Sharkey, Maureen (Robert) Mayer, Ryan (Jorge) Sharkey, Timothy (Antonia) Sharkey, and Kathleen (Nicholas) Minshall as well as grandchildren, Lauren, Morgan, Daley, Rylee, Gannon, Tommie, James, Frankie Grace, and Timothy.

He is also survived by his brother Charles (Diana) Weber and sisters Barbara Weber, Mary (Norman) Smallwood, and Margaret (John) Luccio, plus 18 nieces and nephews, 37 grandnieces and -nephews, 5 great-grandnieces and -nephews, as well as numerous cousins and one aunt.

A graduate of Leadville High School in 1960, he went on to receive degrees from Regis College (Phi Beta Kappa and Wall Street Journal Academic Award), the University of Northern Colorado, and Colorado State University. As a college professor he taught in Aberdeen, SD; Havre, MT; and Golden, CO. He served as an academic administrator at Regis University, Denver, CO, before retiring in August 2008. He continued to be active in his community and church.

Joe was a fifth generation Coloradan, his great-great grandfather and great-grandfather having come to Colorado in 1860. As a member of the Mayflower Society of Colorado, Joe served as Governor twice and treasurer three times and held other offices. He was a member of St. Joseph Catholic Church in Golden where he had served on the Parish Council; and was a member of the Knights of Columbus, Council 5757, also serving as Grand Knight. He was active in Lakewood Rotary in the 1980s and 1990s, and was a Life Member of the Leadville Elks 236. He also held membership in various professional academic associations.

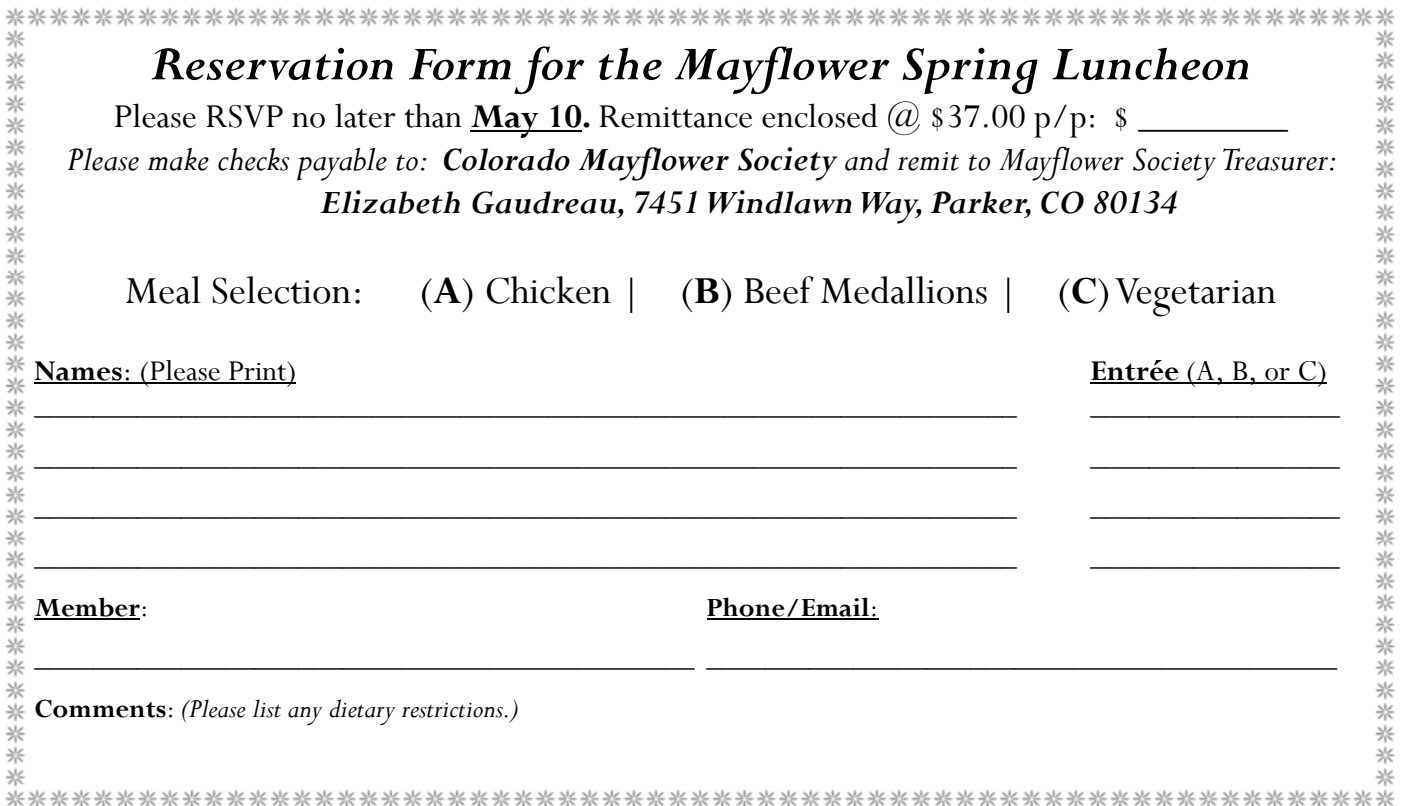

BYLAWS PROPOSED FOR ADOPTION NOV. 12, 2016 BY SANDY CARTER-DUFF

### Article III.

#### Election of Officers.

Sec. 1. Prior to its September meeting, in election years, the Governor shall appoint a nominating committee of five members of the Society which shall name candidates for offices to be filled at the annual meeting of the Society. The ticket named by the nominating committee shall be printed and mailed **or emailed** by the Secretary to each member of the Society at least two weeks before the annual meeting. Any member may also be nominated for any office from the floor at the annual meeting of the Society provided that the nominee has agreed to serve if elected.

### Article IV.

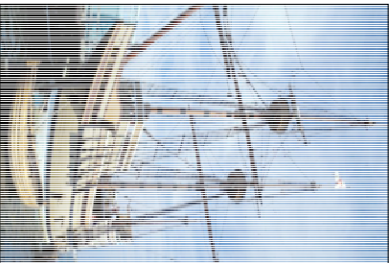
#### Duties of Officers.

Sec. 7. ~~The Historian~~ **A Historian or multiple Co-Historians** ~~or his or her absence or disability; the Assistant Historian;~~ shall offer minor assistance to applicants for membership and shall process Regular Applications, Supplemental Applications, Transfers In, Transfers Out and Dual Memberships in accordance with General Society procedures. **When Co-Historians are elected, each has authority to sign application forms sent to the General Society. One or more Assistant Historians may be elected or appointed to assist Co-Historians as necessary and assist individuals interested in applying as well as those who have applied.** ~~The~~ **A Co-Historian** shall notify applicants of their election following approval of lineage papers by the Historian General or following transfer in and shall notify the person who prepares the certificates. ~~The~~ **A Co-Historian** shall keep a file of final Application papers of all members of the Colorado Society and shall maintain a list of Life Members. ~~The~~ **A Co-Historian** shall make a formal report to the Society members semi-annually. ~~He or she~~ **Co Historians** shall maintain a reference library of General Society books, ordering new publications as they are issued.

Please note that **Mayflower II**, Plimoth Plantation's full-scale reproduction of the tall ship that brought the Pilgrims to Plymouth in 1620, is currently away from her berth at State Pier on the Plymouth Waterfront. Until 2019, the ship will be at Mystic Seaport receiving a full restoration ahead of Plymouth's 400th commemoration of the Pilgrims' arrival on New England's shores. Follow the ship's progress here. The retail shops at Mayflower II will remain open through Thanksgiving (77 Water Street, Plymouth).
